CAPTAIN'S REPORT

It has been an immense privilege to serve as Captain of the China Golfing Society. Steeped in tradition and boasting one of the finest fixture lists, the time has flown by and it has undoubtedly been one of my most enjoyable golfing years. I was fortunate enough to attend most of our fixtures, including two memorable visits to Scotland. Each event gave me the opportunity to play with different members, to share in the camaraderie that makes our Society so special, and to forge new friendships along the way. The experiences at the many distinguished clubs we visited this year are fully recorded in the comprehensive match reports, but my particular favourites have been our tours, highlighted below.

We began with the Suffolk Tour, starting with nine holes at Woodbridge on Bank Holiday Monday, followed by a splendid day at Aldeburgh, where we secured a comfortable win.... against my own home club, no less! The following day we returned to Aldeburgh for the Berwick Trophy, which Nigel Lovett-Turner impressively won for the second consecutive year. After East Anglia we journeyed north for the Scottish Tour, played over the spectacular and challenging courses at Cruden Bay, Murcar, and Newmachar. What a fantastic selection of venues! With members travelling from far and wide, I estimated that collectively we covered some 15,000 return miles - the equivalent of five trips to New York - to take part in this tour.

Next came the ever-popular South Links Tour, played at Littlestone, Rye, and Royal St George's. This tour has long been a highlight of the Society calendar, offering memorable courses and wonderful hospitality from our host clubs. This year we enjoyed a fine win at Rye, though we lost our match at Royal St George's playing for the Guy Pritchard Trophy. The South Links has been excellently managed by Michael Winarick for 12 years, and he has now decided to hand over the reins to the very capable Mike Tibbatts. Next year will see some slight changes to the sequence of play, and Mike is already well on top of the arrangements - please look out for details in the fixture

list. While at Royal St George's, we were proud to confirm our Society's donation of a fine table, soon to be installed in the clubhouse, with an engraved plaque:

"Celebrating 40 years at Royal St George's Presented by China Golf Society – 2024"

Our final tour of the year took us across the Channel to Le Touquet, where we played at Hardelot, Le Touquet, and Wimereux. The first day at Hardelot was a great success – lovely weather if a little windy but with the course in good condition.

Our much-anticipated North vs South match in early June was played over two days at the renowned Lindrick Golf Club together with a day at Worksop GC. Fierce but friendly rivalry was very much in evidence, and this year it was the South who emerged victorious, winning 13½ to 6½. This fixture also includes the annual presentation of the Michael Williams Quaich, awarded to the member who, in the opinion of the Captain and match managers, has made a significant contribution to this event over the years. I was delighted to nominate Ian Menzies, as a very worthy and popular recipient of the Quaich.

Of course, there were many other splendid fixtures across our calendar, each meticulously arranged by our match managers. As I often remind members, our events do not "just happen" - they are the result of careful planning and commitment, and my sincere thanks go to each of our sixteen match managers. This year was also the first under the stewardship of our new President, Michael Winarick. Michael has supported me throughout my captaincy, always ready with wise and timely advice. I am appreciative of both his guidance and his friendship. I would also like to pay special tribute to our committee. Much of their work goes unseen, yet it is thanks to their efforts that our fixtures run seamlessly, our website remains up to date, our finances are carefully managed, and the records of our

Society are diligently maintained. Their support throughout my year has been invaluable, and I am truly grateful. I also wish to extend special thanks to my immediate Past Captain, who now steps down from the committee through rotation, for his wise counsel and guidance. I was also greatly impressed this year by the resilience of two of our members. It was wonderful to see Jolyon Culbertson back on the course after his serious injury in February, and even during his recovery he continued to manage the fixture list with characteristic dedication. It was equally pleasing to welcome Ken Forrest back after his accident just before Christmas. In true Ken fashion, even while recovering from being run over by a pizza delivery van, he still managed to procure the whisky for our Chinese New Year celebration at Reigate Heath. As we all now know — you may be able to keep Ken off the course for a few months, but you will never stop him from keeping the drinks cabinet well stocked!

On a personal note, I am proud to report that, thanks to the generosity of our members, the Society raised an outstanding total of £500 for the East Anglian Air Ambulance, my chosen charity for the year. Of this, £200 was generously donated by our President, Michael Winarick, and a further £300 was raised at our Chinese New Year celebration at Reigate Heath, so ably organised by John Warbey. My sincere thanks to all who contributed to such a worthwhile cause. On the subject of the Chinese New Year celebration, please refer to the fixture list for details of the 2026 change of venue for this everpopular event.

As I look back on my year, I feel proud not only of what we have achieved together, but also of the spirit of friendship that defines the China Golfing Society. Our Society remains as vibrant, welcoming, and full of fellowship as ever - and it has been my privilege to serve as Captain. As I now hand over the captaincy to David Amey, I do so with great confidence that the Society is in safe hands. I look forward to supporting David and to enjoying many more years of golf and friendship with China Golf.

TOURS 2025

THE SUFFOLK TOUR 05-07 MAY

The Tour started on Monday with another fine turnout for our first tour of the China Golfing Society season, and the weather was a delight for our three days in Suffolk. We commenced with a game on the Woodbridge Forest, nine hole course, where three teams battled out a better-ball Stableford, with the winning team comprising Patrick Allen, Dominic Boyle, Simon Sheppard and Mark Waller, scoring 39 points. Nearest the Pin, was won with an excellent shot played by the Captain. In the evening, 17 China Society members attended a splendid dinner at the Aldeburgh Lighthouse Restaurant.

Tuesday saw the annual match against Aldeburgh Golf Club, played over 18 holes with nine foursomes matches. The result was much the same as last year, with China winning 5½ to 3½. Following the golf, there was another fine dinner at the Golf Club attended by 25 Society members with partners, supported by 13 AGC members. The speeches included thanks to the Greenkeeping and Catering staff, with a special appreciation for the Greens staff who have been deeply involved in extensive course modifications. Reference was also made to Aldeburgh being the spiritual home of the China Golfing Society, where we have been playing in one form or another since the early 1900s. The China Golfing Society bench presented to the club in 1966 still sits adjacent to the third green.

On Wednesday morning we played for the Charles Berwick Trophy, a singles match, with the Trophy presented for the second year running to Nigel Lovett-Turner, scoring a fine 39 points. John Weeks and Simon Sheppard both returned scores of 36 points...well done Nigel, again. The Tour concluded with a tasty soup-and-sandwich lunch.

Grateful thanks must go to Clyde Camburn for managing the Tour arrangements so effectively.

THE SCOTTISH TOUR 26-28 MAY

19 golfers gathered at Murcar GC for the traditional Scottish Tour opener on this famous links. The gentle opening par 4 disguised the challenge ahead as is often the way, with the winner amassing a modest 33 points. After the round the group checked into the Kilmarnock Arms for a most enjoyable dinner and a chance to catch up with fellow members in the bar afterwards.

The following day was the highlight of the trip with a round at Cruden Bay GC, played as a pairs better-ball. Conditions were generally excellent with the exception of a brief but intense hail shower towards the end of the round - one of those which barely afforded time to don waterproofs before the sun was shining once again. Drinks were taken again at the Kilmarnock Arms before we returned to the Cruden Bay GC clubhouse to enjoy a first class dinner with unrivalled views over the course in the evening sunlight.

The final day saw a change of pace with a round at the Hawkshill Course at Newmachar GC, a challenging parkland layout, again in perfect weather.

THE SOUTH LINKS TOUR 04-06 AUGUST

Storm Floris greeted China members on arrival at Littlestone, described as 'strong winds,' but which could equally be called a howling gale. The Texas Scramble was a pleasure to play down wind, but against the wind, (particularly the back nine), was a real test of tempo, temper and nerve! However 4 creditable results were achieved, two teams tied on a net 59 complimented by a 63 and 64. The Flackley Ash hotel once again provided excellent hospitality at the most reasonable rate and dawn on Tuesday, to great relief of all broke clear - sunny with just a gentle zephyr.

12 of the party left for Rye to be met by just 10 Rye Members. Playing the first 7 holes of the Old Course before weaving round the Jubilee where they met a senior Naval Officer and partner in a buggy clearly enjoying themselves in a buggy without the inconvenience of an opposition. A satisfactory win by 2½ to 1½ was achieved without claiming an extra point by the default. Meanwhile the Vice-Captain led his team of 4 at Littlestone in a four ball competition and achieved a commendable gross 70.

And so to the Blazing Donkey, where all but one member arrived in time to help destroy the establishment's list of 'bin end' wines, all at most reasonable prices. The moral of the tour however is that there are few and (very) far between charging points for electric cars in this

part of Kent! At dinner a toast was made to Major General Ronnie McAllister (both Captain and President of Royal St George's and keen China Member) who founded the fixture 41 years ago. Sadly it did not inspire us sufficiently, for on a beautiful day at Sandwich we lost 7-1...but the lunch made up for everything!

Next year will see significant changes to the Tour. I shall stand down after 12 years as Match Manager and I am delighted to say Mike Tibbatts will take the reins. Additionally, Royal St George's are unable to entertain us on a Wednesday and the fixture will move to the Monday. More about that will be forthcoming as new plans emerge. It has been a great pleasure and privilege to run the tour and my real thanks go to Ross Logan and James Proudlock, the respective Match Managers, for their outstanding support, help and assistance, no matter the problem. Without them there would be no matches so many, many thanks.

THE FRENCH TOUR 15-18 SEPTEMBER

The French tour is very much the end of season CGS tour, gathering together like minded souls for a few days of good company, good food, (and wine) and good golf. This year did not disappoint. The rain held off, and all 16 players managed to play every day — and for once, the rain and wind gods stayed away at Wimeraux.

After a convivial gathering at the bar in the welcoming Bristol Hotel, the first dinner was held, as last year, at Jean's Café. The order of play and players were handed out, this being repeated at the following dinners. Your President won the auction with a sizeable donation.

CHINESE NEW YEAR MEETING AT REIGATE HEATH GC 13 FEBRUARY

Michael Williams Quaich 2025

Last year the society inaugurated the Michael Williams Quaich - this trophy was conceived to be presented annually for the member of the society who, in the opinion of the Captain, has made a significant contribution to the North vs South match. This year, after consulting with many members, the Captain nominated Ian Menzies as the recipient in recognition to all the work he has done over the years in

connection with the North South Tour. In fact Ian has done an enormous amount of work for the China Golfing Society but has never really wanted to put his head above the parapet and he always worked determinedly in the background. Ian unfortunately could not attend on the day and so the Captain passed the Quaich to Simon Sheppard who agreed to arrange the engraving and personally present the Quaich to Ian.

The date for next year's summer meeting is 8 July 2026.

MATCH vs CALCUTTA GS - THE HARDWICK TROPHY - 10 JULY

This annual event was played again at Blackmoor Golf Club, competing for the Hardwick Trophy that was presented by Joe Hardwick many years ago and is now a feature of this regular get together with our great friends in the Calcutta Golf Society. The weather was set fine at Blackmoor and we played an exhilarating seven a side, 4BBB match in temperatures around 28C...the course, as usual, was in excellent condition with the greens and fairways playing extremely well. The Blackmoor greens staff did a splendid job on the course despite the extensive dry period experienced in the south of England. The hospitality provided by Blackmoor was up to their usual high standard with a fine pre match sandwich and chips lunch and a splendid golfers supper of lasagne and salad to complete the day.

Now onto the results...as you will be aware China are the holders of the Hardwick Trophy and we managed another comfortable 5 matches to 2 win over Calcutta ...the same score as last year! It was pleasing to see some new members playing and there was an exceptional eagle 2 on the 18th hole expertly performed by Rick Lipscombe...with a fantastic 5 wood beautifully struck some 200 yards straight into the hole.

The Calcutta Captain, Rob Wild, gave another 'memorial speech' on behalf of Calcutta and provided some memorable words about 'Joe the Pro' Hardwick who was professional at both Royal Calcutta and Royal Hong Kong Golf clubs for some 20 years.

JOINT SOCIETIES MEETING AT CUDDINGTON GC 17 JULY

Four pairs from each of Calcutta, Malaya, Kenya, Latin America and China Golfing Societies gathered on a warm dry day at Cuddington GC in South London to contest the Hodder Cup. The aggregate of the best 3 better ball Stableford scores from each Society would decide the outcome of this year's Cup with China going for an unheralded three wins in succession. However on the day the pressure was just too great and the Cup was deservedly won by Latin America. The results for 2025 in team order (plus totals for 2022, 2023 and 2024 for comparison) were as follows:

Overall this year's scores overall were impressive, particularly with the number of teams this year (18) getting 40 points or over.

QUADRANGULAR TROPHY MEETING SANDY LODGE GC 14 AUGUST

This year's tournament was an abbreviated affair: the Reform Club withdrew its participation a week before, unable to raise a team. The Oriental Club was reduced to five whilst we fielded only seven players. The East India Club, holder of the trophy and this year's organiser, proposed a three-way event with the best four stableford scores to count to the team score - to which we and the Oriental Club agreed. The course at Sandy Lodge was in good condition though in common with courses around the country, its fairways were very dry and firm. The greens were in good shape, fast and subtle: being above the hole was not a good idea and even the shortest of putts demanded our best attention.

Most of us had a Shipping Forecast round ("good to fair, occasionally very poor") though Simon Sheppard led the way with a most impressive 36 points. In the end, we lost to the Oriental Club whose best four cards totalled 132, we had 127 and the East India 120. As always, Sandy Lodge took good care of us: supper was very agreeable. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 2025

The meeting was held at the Nevill GC on September 25th

Approval of the Minutes of the AGM held on 4th November 2024 Approval of the Minutes was proposed by David Amey and seconded by Mike Tibbatts and passed.

Captain's Review of the Year

The Captain stated that it had been a real privilege to captain the Society, which has such rich traditions and an outstanding fixture list, and it been one his most enjoyable years. He is grateful for the many new friendships that he has made. Highlights of the year included nominating Ian Menzies for this year's Michael Williams Quaich; The South winning the annual North/South match; a superb calendar, which as ever, was ably managed by the Match Managers, without whom the Society couldn't function. The Captain especially valued the wise counsel of the Society's new President, Michael Winarick and the members of the Committee. Finally, he

thanked all those who made contributions, totalling £500, to his charity namely the East Anglian Air Ambulance.

Treasurer's Report

In connection with the 2024/25 Financial Statement the Treasurer noted that the draft and unaudited accounts were included in the AGM pack and asked if there were any questions. He provided a summary of the accounts: Income was generated from membership subscriptions (£3,525) and tour/match fees (£1,548) and sale of kit (£335). Expenditure was incurred through website costs (£1,656), Year book (£563), Prizes (£1,346), Royal St George's table (£750) and a provision for bad debt (£1,300). The result is a net loss of £207, which is disappointing. Without the provision for bad debt there would have been an operating surplus of £1,093.

The Treasurer commented that the provision for bad debt has arisen through the entry into liquidation of the Blazing Donkey venue – one of the overnight stops on the South Links Tour. The Society paid (and effectively lost) a 50% cash deposit for all those staying. Those members staying however paid in full for their room on arrival meaning the cash deposit was never used nor refunded. Those members who paid by credit card were encouraged to claim a refund (50% of the cost of a night's stay at £165 = £82.50) from their credit card issuer under Section 75 of the 1974 Consumer Credit Act. Some members have started that process and others are encouraged to do the same.

There was discussion about the need formally to audit the accounts and the need for the AGM to consider audited accounts. The Treasurer invited Mike Tibbatts to comment on differences between the Kitmaster and Treasurer on stock/prize valuations. Mr Tibbatts congratulated the Treasurer on producing the draft accounts and commented that the difference was not that big. Mr Culbertson suggested that the Captain should enquire if there is a discrepancy, to which the answer is yes, and the Captain agreed that the 2024/25

Financial Statements should be audited and circulated to membership on completion. It is hoped that future Financial Statements would not have such discrepancies and so no audit would be necessary. For the 2025/26 budget, the Treasurer is forecasting as follows: Total Income of c. £5,000 and Expenditure of c. £3,200

Discussion included the need for more formality around the Society's governance (such as annual audit) and the need for a constitution. Mr Tibbatts opined that there should be such, not least because the Society is now charging annual subscriptions to members. Others disagreed and voiced that the low turnout at the AGM was evidence that more formality is not needed.

Membership Secretary's Report

The Membership Secretary noted the work done to update the membership list: Of the total members listed on the Society's web site 136 are active (i.e. have paid their annual subscription) and 145 inactive (no subscription paid). Many of the inactive members have no contact details recorded (or club membership, handicap etc) and so contact is not possible and perhaps their records should be deleted. In response to a query from Mr Coulcher, the Membership Secretary re-affirmed last year's AGM decision that inactive members will not be sent a Year Book, for which access will be available via the web site.

Of more relevance is the frequency of attendance at the Society's events, at which only half of the active members participated and of those, some 60% participated less than 3 times. Tours are more popular than single day fixtures. Possibly the fixture list needs to be reviewed but work needs to be done to encourage greater participation, and the Membership Secretary will be sending regular reminders during 2026 for members to sign up to fixtures. During the year the Society recruited 2 new members and, sadly, has been notified of 3 deaths.

The Membership Secretary also reported on improvements to the Society's web site principally to formalise and make match management easier. Match managers will be encouraged to insist on members using the web site to register for a fixture, with a sanction that, if not, then members will not be selected for the fixture. The upgrades to the web site will go live after the last matches in 2025 and before the 2026 season starts. It is hoped that a more usable web site will be more acceptable to new and younger members and so assist in a recruitment drive. Mr Warbey pointed to the 'elephant in the room' being that younger members tend to be working full time and so less able to take days off to play in a Society fixture. Re recruitment, Messrs Tibbatts and Smith are due to visit Hong Kong before the end of 2025 and will do their best to spread the message about the Society through the various clubs in Hong Kong.

Fixtures Secretary Report

The Fixtures Secretary reported that the 2026 fixture list is largely confirmed and congratulated match managers on so doing not least because golf clubs' fixture lists are getting ever more crowded; 9.00am tee times are getting more difficult to arrange; a dislike amongst members of foursomes format; and fixture costs are ever rising. Alan Wilkinson suggested a solution might be to start later with a brunch meal at 11.00am and tee times from 12.30. There will have to be some radical re-arranging of the South Links Tour caused by changes at Royal St Georges GC, which prevent that annual match from being played on a Wednesday and so the Society match will now be played on a Monday. The President has also handed over the management of this tour to Mike Tibbatts. A variety of suggestions were made including participating in the Littlestone Pro-Am event; re-arranging the fixtures at Littlestone and Rye; perhaps playing the match v Piltdown on the way home.

Election of Captain for 2026

The Captain was delighted to propose that David Amey be elected Captain for the 2026 season. He was seconded by Mike Tibbatts with unanimous approval from those present.

Election of the Vice Captain for 2026

David Amey was delighted to propose that Terry Smith be elected Vice Captain for the 2026 season. David Hill seconded the proposal with unanimous approval from those present.

A note from the President

My sincere apologies for being absent on parade today. I have been waiting for a Lumbar Decompression Operation for over 6 months and of course the date selected had to coincide with our AGM. Many of you who will have enjoyed a wonderful morning's golf on the Nevill's excellent course under Mike Taylors guidance. I would like to add my thanks to the Club and to Michael for all the arrangements. I was always taught that Presidents should be seen and not heard. Today, sadly, I shall not be seen, but I have asked the Vice Captain if he would be kind enough to read out what I would and should have said. First, to those who ask where is the President's wine, I have to say, that was a habit rather than a tradition of my distinguished predecessor. I have instead made an equivalent contribution to the Captain's Charity and I encourage you to contribute to this most worthy cause. If there are any dry throats, you will, at least, have a safer drive home.

Secondly, I would like to record my thanks to all those involved in running our Society over the past year. Here I must begin with Nigel, our quite excellent Captain. He has travelled the length and breadth of the Country attending, I think, almost all of our fixtures. That is some ask, as I can verify from many years ago, and sets the precedent for his heirs and successors. I envy his organisational skills and congratulate him on a job, really well done...or should I say nearly done....for there are a couple for fixtures still to go. I would also thank all the Members of The Committee. The three Davids, Jolyon,

Alan along with Alistair in Scotland and Tim in Hong Kong. Their work often goes unsung and unrecognised but is vital in the efficient running and continuance of the Society. And finally, my thanks to all our Match Managers without whom we would not maintain and enjoy the impressive fixture list we enjoy both North and South. We must support them wherever and whenever possible. It is no easy task, as I am well aware, and whilst there are always unavoidable last-minute cancellations and changes, I would hope we can keep those to a minimum. If a player has to fallout, please, first of all, look for your own replacement before informing and relying on the unfortunate Match Manager. To the new Captain and his Vice, I wish them good luck with hopefully a win at Royal St George's in 2026!

Any other business

The Captain advised that the annual subscription for 2026 would remain the same at £25. The Treasurer and Membership Secretary will be sending out payment reminders towards the end of the year. Alan Wilkson asked for confirmation that an inactive member registering to play in a fixture he must first pay the annual subscription to be eligible. The Membership Secretary confirmed this to be the case.

Michael Tibbatts suggested that the AGM does not have to be held after the Jack Martin cup meeting at the Nevill, particularly if alternative venues might encourage a larger turnout. The Membership Secretary suggested future AGMs could be held at any suitable time via the medium of ZOOM.
